here has not been any significant downward or upward trend in the Hospital's service indicators in the last three years.

Figures collated from the various UDSs indicate that Korle Bu's OPD attendance, admissions and discharges, deliveries, operations and maternal mortality rates have been generally stable.

Between 2015 to 2017, the Hospital's OPD Attendance was between 323,234 to 339,128 with the highest attendance in 2017 (339,128).

The Hospital registered 3,181 deaths in 2017 while 2016 and 2015 had 3,515 and 3,261 respectively.

Maternal mortality rate for the three years under review also did not show any significant change . Figures for the three years were 528, 641 and 604 respectively.

For a premier specialist health facility such as Korle Bu, overall figures collected in the last three years is of concern. The *Korle Bu Bulletin* asked the Head of Biostatistics to give possible insight into the figures.

Speaking to the Head of Biostatistics, Mr. Alex Arhin, he agreed that data for the last three years had been flat. He however noted that a number of reasons could be attributed for these figures.

Mr. Arhin said currently, many health facilities had sprung up especially in Accra, giving patients options on where to go for care. "This multiplicity gives clinicians options on where to refer their cases to", he added.

"Another major reason which can account for our flat data is the unfortunate perception that there are undue delays when accessing care in Korle Bu", he said. The result of this impression, he said, is that patients go to other facilities for care and will only come to Korle Bu as a final alternative and not as a first choice referral point.

He also noted that the shutting down of the surgical theatres in 2016 could have accounted for the low figures for operations undertaken in the Hospital for that year.

Even though the Hospital seems to be facing challenges on the health front, the Head of Biostatistics noted that all is not lost yet. He said Korle Bu has the most skilled medical personnel and state-of-the-art equipment and we are still the best in healthcare delivery.

"The Hospital needs to embark on an aggressive campaign to inform the public about some of our unique services and success stories", he added.

Over 1,500 Die from Cervical Cancer: It is Time to Take Action

ranslating knowledge gained on cervical cancer into positive action is the only way to reduce the disease condition.

The action, such as reporting early for treatment and undergoing cervical screening tests and governmental support will ensure that incidence of mortality through the disease condition will be reduced and eventually eradicated. It is not enough that the public is aware of the disease condition.

Prof. Anyetei Lassey, Obstetrician/Gyneacologist Specialist said this at the launch of the Cervical Cancer awareness month, under the theme; "Knowing and doing".

He said being aware of the condition the public needs to take the next steps to protect themselves.

"Over 1,500 women in Ghana die of cervical cancer yearly due to lack of knowledge or inability to take steps to prevent themselves from cervical cancer", Prof. Lassey said.

He said, various interventions such as abstinence from sex, vaccination and pap smear tests were all available to ensure that women do not die from Cervical Cancer Cervical cancer is a chronic infection caused by the Human Papiloma Virus (HPV), which is sexually transmitted. The HPV 16 and 18 are associated with 70% of cervical cancers. When the virus gets into contact with the transformation zone of a woman's

cervix, it can take between 15 to 20 years to progress into full blown cancer.

In a presentation on cervical cancer, Dr. Kwaku Asah-Poku (Obst & Gynae) said 528,000 new cases of cervical cancers are diagnosed yearly worldwide with about 266,000 women dying from the disease.

"In Ghana, 3,052 women are diagnosed with cervical cancers every year with 1,556 of the total number dying. It is estimated that every five (5) hours, a woman dies from cervical cancer", he said.

Dr. Asah noted that cervical cancer is the commonest gyneacological cancer brought to the Hospital, with the average age of being 51 years.

He said the disease condition constituted 51% of all deaths from gynaecological malignancies in 2017.

He noted that early detection of the disease condition can ensure prevention and treatment. He therefore urged the public, especially women who are sexually active to get tested for cervical cancer and also encourage others to do same.

For those who are not sexually active or children between ages nine to 12 years, they could be vaccinated against the disease condition, Dr. Asah said. A newsletter of the Korle Bu Teaching Hospital



# New Equipment For Minimal Invasive Surgeries

The Genito-Urinary Unit has received an endoscopic camera system for minimal invasive surgeries. The equipment, which comprises a monitor, light source and a camera, is used during major surgeries to aid the doctor create a small incision and see inside the patient, with the help of the camera.

This intervention helps to conduct surgeries without major cut or openings. Patients can therefore be discharged the same day or the next day after surgery.

Receiving the equipment, Head of Urology, Dr. J.E Mensah said the machine helps in speedy patient recovery after surgery. He said the inclusion of the monitor is very important as it enables medical professionals to be trained in the course of a surgery.

Mr Samuel Akotuah Atweri, the Director of HR, thanked Tropical Cables and Conductor Limited for their donation and assured them that the equipment will be put to good use under the watch of Dr. J.E. Mensah. He also used the opportunity to call on other corporate organizations to invest strategically in healthcare because their donations will go a long way to change patients' experience at the hospital.

The Endoscopic camera system was donated by Tropical Cables and Conductor Limited to the Genito-Urinary Unit at a cost of \$5,500.

reatment of jaundice in babies has received a boost with the donation of a phototherapy machine.

To enhance the care of babies with jaundice, officials from GECAD Healthcare Limited presented a phototherapy machine to NICU. ## **KBTH TO BEGIN COCHLEAR IMPLANTS SERVICE**



he Hospital will soon begin cochlear implants service to assist people with profound hearing loss to regain the ability to hear and speak.

The project is being planned by the Hospital and Med-EL, a medical electronics company headquartered in Austria.

In line with this plan, the Hospital has initiated newborn screening to identify babies with hearing disabilities so that the defects can be corrected in time.

This was disclosed when a team from Med-EL met with our Ag. Chief Executive, Dr Felix Anyah and his Management as well as the Ear, Nose & Throat (ENT) consultants.

Dr. Felix Anyah, said the introduction of this new service is in line with the Hospital's plan of introducing medical tourism. He said when the procedure is finally introduced it will be available not only to Ghanaians but patients from neighbouring countries such as Togo, Benin, Nigeria, Cote d'voire, Burkina Faso, among others.

The Africa Development & Regional Manager of Med-EL, Mr. Mohammed EL Disouky said they will support KBTH in the development of the requisite infrastructure and equipment for the service.

Mr. Disouky called on the government and tax authorities to review the high rate of tax that is slapped on hearing aids. He said this had contributed in making the price of the implant expensive and out of reach of patients.

Prof. E.D. Kitcher, an ENT consultant said the introduction of the cochlear implants service will help Ghanaians who are currently unable to hear to overcome that disability.

He noted that about 10% of the Ghanaian population suffer from one hearing disability or another. He called for the support of all stakeholders to enable the Hospital successfully introduce the service.

## ALL YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT CERVICAL CANCER

Cervical cancer is caused by the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV).

- HPV is sexually transmitted
- The HPV is found in 99% of cervical cancers (with HPV 16 & 18 associated with 70% of cervical cancers).

#### **Risk Factors**

- Early sexual intercourse
- Multiple sexual partners
- Too many frequent births
- Early marriage
- A partner whose wife has died from cervical cancer
- Smoking
- •

#### Signs and Symptoms

It takes between 15-20years from the time of HPV infection for it to progress into full blown cervical cancer. During this time, there are no symptoms to show that one has the disease condition.

The following symptoms may be observed when the condition is in its far advanced stages. They are:

- Abnormal vaginal discharge
- Lower abdominal pain
- Weight loss
- Retention of urine
- Lower back pain

#### Management

- 1) Pre-cancer Stage:
  - -Follow up
  - -Freezing
  - -Excision
- 2) Cervical Cancer Stage:
- Early stages: At the early stage of cervical cancer, surgery or radiotherapy may be employed to stop further progression
- · Late stages: Radiotherapy is the option
- Very late stages: Unfit for radiotherapy, therefore Palliative care

#### Complications


This is especially when the condition has progressed. They are;


- Bleeding
- Obstruction of the ureter
- Kidney failure
- Fistula formation

- Infection
- Spread to other parts of the body

#### Prevention

- ABC of prevention of sexually transmitted diseases
- Abstinence
- Being faithful to one sexual partner
- Condom-use
- Delay in onset of sexual intercourse
- Education
- PAP Smear Tests- this has reduced incidence of cervical cancer by nearly 80% and death by 70% in developed countries.
